Seniors get break on cost of meds

Gov finds \$55M for program

Gov. Chris Christie Wednesday backed down from a budget proposal that would have forced thousands of the state's elderly and disabled residents to pay more for their medications.

The governor announced that he had found the \$55.5 million needed to fully fund the state's Pharma-ceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled program.

Christie's proposed fis-cal year 2011 budget had required an estimated 164,000 senior citizens and disabled people who subscribe to the program to pay a \$310 annual deductible and \$15 for every namebrand drug they purchased. Currently, those enrolled in the PAAD and Senior Gold programs pay no deductible and a \$7 copay for name-brand drugs.

The proposed changes were rescinded as a result of "revised estimates" for certain things such as ge-neric drug use and drug manufacturers' rebate payments, Christie spokesman Kevin Roberts said.

"Thanks to increased use of generics, greater. manufacturer rebates and discounts and expanded eligibility for Medicare Part D subsidies, we are now able to restore funding for next year's budget that maintains zero deductibles and low copayments for PAAD and Senior Gold. without requiring additional cuts to programs and services," Christie said in the prepared re-
