

Voters defend ballot secrecy

Officials accused of intimidation

ASBURY PARK — A prominent community leader denounced county officials Tuesday for questioning residents about their council election votes, calling it "voter suppression."

Standing beside a group of energized residents on the steps of the Monmouth County Prosecutor's Office building on Main Street here, Brother John Muhammad said he will not tolerate investigators asking residents whether they voted for the A-Team ticket. He said voters are afforded "secrecy" in casting their ballots by state law.
