Camden plant's neighbors surprised



An ongoing investiga-tion into the failed Times Square bombing led the FBI to search a home in Cherry Hill and a print-ing business in Camden's Cramer Hill on Thurs-

day. Officials said they col-Ontetas sain they con-lected physical evidence at the Cherry Hill condo-minium of Pakistani-born Muhammad Fiaez and Iqbal Hinjhara. Hinj-hara, 49, owns Prompt Printing Press Inc. in Camden Camden.

Testimony wraps up

TRENTON - The federal government's case against a former Shore assemblyman accused of taking a \$10,000 bribe from a supposed developer who turned out to be an FBI in-formant could go to the jury Monday.

The defense Thursday rested its case in the trial of the United States of America v. Daniel M. Van Pelt, and U.S. District Judge Joel A. Pisano distributed by the state of the state missed the jury for the weekend. He directed the 12 jurors and three alternates to return to the Clarkson S. Fisher Federal Building and U.S. Court-house Monday morning.

At that time, the panel will hear closing arguments by lawyers for the U.S. Attorney's Office and Van Pelt, and Pisano will deliver his jury charge, in-structions about the laws applicable in determining whether a defendant is guilty or not. The case will then be handed over to the jury for a verdict.
